Reading

Reading is one of the most important life skills a child develops, and this development starts from the very beginning.

There are a variety of reading schemes for the children to work through. We listen to them read as often as we can in the week and it is important you listen to your child read at home as well. The class teacher will move the child onto the next level of reading when they are ready.





Reading, however, does not come easy to all children and it is important to ensure reading to an adult remains a relaxed, enjoyable experience and not a battle.

Other ways to engage children with reading in a more discrete manner:

- Audiobooks
- Subtitles on the TV and no volume!
- Cooking getting the children involved in selecting the recipe and following the instructions
- Crafting, lego, playing board games etc following instructions to achieve a task
- Days out as a family eg going to a museum or zoo and recognising letter sounds/ words in different environments

Phonics & Spelling

Spelling and the development of spelling goes hand in hand with reading. The more children practise recognising letter sounds by listening, segmenting and blending so their spelling skills will develop. This is all starts with pre-writing activities.

Rainbow Writing



Rainbow writing makes spelling practice more enjoyable. Through the use of crayons and coloured pencils, children can create a rainbow style effect to help improve spelling and help it stick in the mind.

Sounding Out Words

When sounding out words, you say each letter sound as slowly as possible (c...a...t) to decode the letters, and then you say the word (cat). This process is called blending where letter sounds are blended together to form a word.

SUPERSONIC Phonic Friends




We continue with the phonics scheme 'Supersonic Phonic Friends' that the children were introduced to last year.

All the children take part in a phonics screening assessment at the beginning of term. Children will then be placed into a suitable group and will be taught phonics vertically using this data. They will have 4 phonics sessions a week. Children are able to move and progress in their phonics throughout the term.

- 2. Help your child to link sounds to single letters/ phonemes, digraphs & trigraphs
- 3. Segmenting & blending sounds together to read simple words e.g. c_a_t
- 4. Tricky words are High Frequency words that cannot be sounded out e.g the

- 6. Read as much as you can to your child

- Using imagination to innovate a story


